This document shall become part of the River District board meeting minutes and is subject to disclosure under the California Public Records Act.

Speaker Time Limits

Speakers have two minutes to address the board and may speak on up to four items per meeting. We ask that a separate speaker slip be submitted for each item. Speakers may not concede their time to another speaker. The presiding officer may further limit time allotted.

Purpose of Public Comment

The board welcomes your comments and requests that you present your remarks in a respectful manner, within established time limits, and focus on the issues which directly affect the District. The board provides opportunities for the public to address them as a body so that the board may hear the public’s opinions regarding items on the agenda that affect the River District property and business owners.

Comments from the public:

- Public comments should be consistent with the Brown Act meaning only items on the agenda and properly noticed to the public may be discussed.
- Comments on items not on the agenda and brought forward by the public will be considered for inclusion at a future meeting.
- Comments are not intended to be question and answer periods or conversations with the board.
- Comments should be addressed to the board, not to an individual board member or another party in the audience.

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
